This has been an important year for the Tahoe Truckee Community Foundation. We would like to thank all our donors and partners for making 2014 such a meaningful success.

Our majestic mountains and Lake Tahoe provide us with a beautiful, magical place to live, raise our families, and retire. Yet, there are two Tahoes: one of recreation and privilege, and one of increasing need. We were shocked to learn that over 37% of the people in our community live at least 200% below the poverty line! In addition, three years of drought have put extreme stress on our merchants and working families.

Donors often ask the question, "If TTCF supports our nonprofits, why not just donate directly to those organizations?" It's a good question. Put another way, they are really asking, "What is the unique role of a community foundation?"

We are all about on-the-ground, street-level philanthropy. We believe in matching the resources of our donors to the impact we collectively seek. In 2014 we, along with our donors, granted more than \$1 million to our nonprofit community. Over \$60,000 went to local youth, through scholarships.

Allow us to touch on two important efforts in 2014 that exemplify TTCF's unique community leadership role. On the following pages, you will learn of our Community Collaborative's Community Report Card, and our Community House completion. Both efforts represent an enormous amount of work, involving many different partners, who made them successful. We are ever so grateful for everyone who has played a role in these impactful initiatives.

INTRODUCING GIVE BACK TAHOE



GIVE BACK TAHOE

This holiday season TTCF in partnership with Sierra Sun, announced a new way to Give Back to Tahoe! In years past, many of you received a small envelope to return to TTCF with your "Gifts for Good" to a chosen area of impact. While this direct-mail campaign boosted our grant making cycle, more and more of our donors want to donate directly and easily on-line. To better serve and hopefully attract new donors, the Gifts for Good campaign evolved into a Holiday Giving Guide on a broader platform.

The end-of-year giving kicked off the Friday before Thanksgiving with an announcement to all of North Tahoe-Truckee in our local newspaper, and project co-sponsor, Sierra Sun. In a comprehensive printed booklet, and the freshly launched website of www.givebacktahoe.org, the familiar Gifts for Good categories were made available alongside specific descriptions of over 60 nonprofit efforts and their year-end fundraising goals. The Give Back Tahoe website celebrated the generosity in our community with up-to-the-minute tracking of donations, as well as a leader board, to see which organizations were receiving funding. Both the print and electronic guides featured our Gifts for Good offering, with opportunities to give directly to TTCF's community grant making funds which will be granted to our local nonprofit organizations.

Many communities around the country have hosted "Give Days," but it just didn't make sense for our region, which is made up of many second homeowners and recreational visitors. Plus, it is a lot of energy to put on a one-day giving event. This way, we built a platform for our nonprofits to capture end-of-year gifts, and the partnership with Sierra Sun helped us promote the campaign all season long through large print ads and social media.

We are excited about the community response to the printed guide and the collective giving that took place. We look forward to continuing this effort next year, and hopefully, for years to come.

COMMUNITY COLLABORATIVE OF TAHOE TRUCKEE (CCTT)



The Community Collaborative of Tahoe Truckee is comprised of over 45 health, education, and social service agencies that work to support the fundamental needs of our local residents. The "Collaborative" is a program of the Tahoe Truckee Community Foundation, and supported by S.H. Cowell Foundation and First 5 of Nevada and Placer Counties. This year, we released the Tahoe Truckee Community Report Card. It is the culmination of a three year effort to use data to highlight issues impacting local residents. The Community Report Card utilizes Results Scorecard 3.0 to measure community indicators, and highlights economic well-being, health, and education trends in our community. This effort provides a really important opportunity for the community to align our efforts and resources to take on some of our toughest challenges. The goal is to ultimately develop strategy that can guide future impact in areas like economic development, education, and community health.

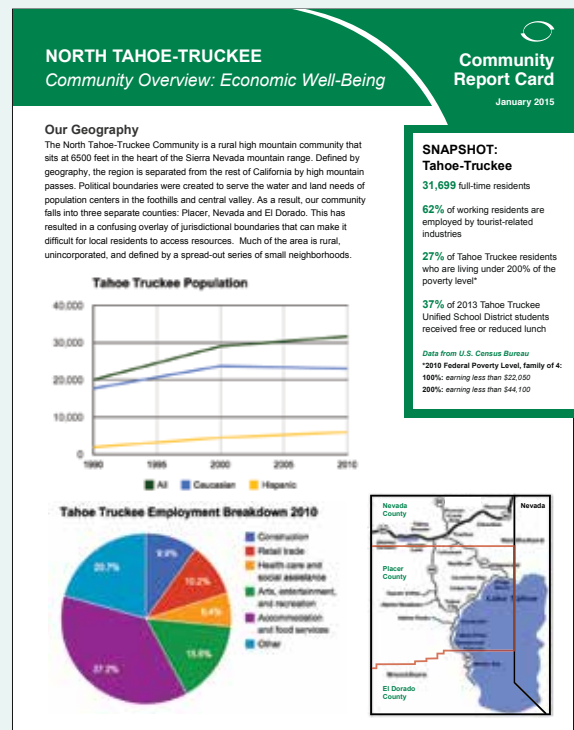

FOUNDATION PARTNER: S.H. COWELL FOUNDATION

Since 1999, The S.H. Cowell Foundation has been a steadfast, often behind the scenes, resource partner that has invested significant resources in this region. Based in San Francisco, the S.H. Cowell Foundation improves the lives of impoverished Northern and Central Californian families by uniting people across all sectors in shaping strong, sustainable communities.

Through their support of many of our family focused nonprofits, they have made a huge impact in families throughout our region. The three initiatives highlighted in these pages: the Community Collaborative, Tahoe Truckee Reads, and Community House are all projects that the S.H. Cowell Foundation not only supported, but helped catalyze and sustain. For that, we are humbly and forever grateful for their partnership, support, and generosity.

COLLABORATION IS THE KEY TO COMMUNITY CHANGE

Our region is challenged with multiple regional jurisdictions, state and county lines, and the mountain terrain that separates us from our sister cities. So, it is a small wonder when a collaboration that represents cross-over civic leaders, multiple institutional partners, and scores of nonprofit leaders work together to take on a challenge in a systemic way.

In 2012, a conversation started among TTCF, our Community Collaborative (CCTT), and Excellence in Education that has led to dramatic community progress and repeated



national recognition. The topic: *the persistent academic achievement gap from which our low-income children suffer*. That one conversation evolved rapidly to become an immense community effort for change: Tahoe Truckee Reads (TTReads). TTReads has committed to improving third grade literacy rates through improving school attendance, pre-kindergarten school readiness camps, and literacy programs to prevent summer learning loss.

This fall, a Tahoe Truckee Unified School District (TTUSD) school bus loaded with local, regional, and national partners

toured Truckee and Kings Beach to examine the intricate network of organizations that has answered the call to action set forth by the National Campaign for Grade Level Reading (NCGLR). They came together to capture what the North Tahoe Region is “doing right.” With logistics coordinated by Excellence in Education and local partners, we embarked on a day-long adventure.

Our tour began at Alder Creek Middle School where NCGLR presented an award and praise for TTUSD educators and staff as national “Pacesetters” in the Campaign. Afterwards, we toured the region and called attention to the vastly different living conditions of our children. Two things became crystal clear: first, we recognized the need for continued support to tackle our region’s complex and unique economic challenges; second, we highlighted the monumental impact that our collaborative efforts have already created at sites we visited. Our national colleagues applauded Truckee Tahoe’s commitment for giving each and every student the attention and resources necessary to succeed.

Today, the effort is going strong with the direction and support of Excellence in Education, TTUSD, and our on-the-ground nonprofit partners. CCTT helps monitor and track the initiative across the agencies through their Results Based Accountability framework. And, at TTCF, we continue to marvel at the important role we can play as a catalyst, convener, and collaborator for our community.

COMMUNITY HOUSE COMPLETED



Just over four years ago, an undeniable need made itself heard. One of our communities was buckling under a socio-economic burden, and the effect was crippling the families and children that called that area home.

TTCF, our generous donors, and collaborative partners rose to the occasion and quickly developed a plan to alleviate the suffering of our neighbors. TTCF oversaw the planning, construction, and implementation process of the Kings Beach Community House, and it was completed this year as a base for three important nonprofit family and citizen resource initiatives: Project MANA, a hunger relief agency; Tahoe SAFE Alliance; and North Tahoe Family Resource Center share a common roof and a collective commitment, with space left over for citizens of North Lake Tahoe to attend classes, meetings, and counseling sessions as a means to creating better lives. Community House provides easily accessible and comprehensive support services to nurture and empower individuals and families, and to ensure the health and well-being of our children.

DONOR HIGHLIGHT: RICK STEPHENS



Rick Stephens was born in Louisville, Kentucky, and lived in Kansas, Kentucky and New Jersey growing up. He attended Cornell University, where he met his wife and secured his degree in Engineering, with an intermission to serve three years in the U.S. Army, including a tour in Vietnam. He earned his MBA at Stanford, and worked 40 years in commercial real estate. He and Gail raised two daughters while working and living in Los Angeles and the San Francisco-Bay Area.

Rick and Gail are permanent residents of Truckee with a vacation apartment in San Francisco. Rick is passionate

about our community. He says that he lives here and wants to help make it better. Rick and Gail are interested in the local environment, especially the Truckee River Watershed Council and supporting local nonprofits through direct donations and through TTCF. These past four years, Rick found himself serving in the most unique way: as the volunteer project manager for the TTCF Community House.

Rick describes his early involvement as making the mistake of answering a phone call from Theresa May Duggan. Rick claims, "She twisted my arm into helping TTCF purchase the property and then serving as property manager oversight of the general contractor."

With the types of challenges a construction project can bring, especially one inside the basin of Lake Tahoe, Rick's work deserves deep acknowledgement and recognition, perhaps even superhero status. Reflecting on the now complete project, he believes the best reward has been seeing the nonprofits, who now office at Community House, serving our community in a dignified space.

Rick believes that giving back is very rewarding to the giver. "Yes, everyone is busy, but the busy people are the ones you want involved in the community."

When Rick does not have on his cape, he enjoys spending time with his daughters, their husbands, and his granddaughter Zoe. This picture captures him on a 50-mile cross-Sierra Nevada hike he made this past summer.



QUEEN OF HEARTS
WOMEN'S FUND

Queen of Hearts celebrated another amazing year! Together, we granted \$50,000 to eight local NPOs with four of those nonprofits receiving \$10,000 towards their missions. The sold-out annual dinner in May, a farm-to-table event that also premiered the first version of Elevate Tahoe, a video that is now gaining national attention. 2014 QoH networking events commenced and culminated with a December networking/shopping event, netting \$2,000 in charitable funds. To celebrate the holidays, Queen of Hearts members adopted and spoiled over 90 senior citizens in the Senior Gift Giving Program. This year, we also engaged QoH young women and girls as members of Girls Giving Back, who began fundraising for their first youth grant cycle in 2015.

DONOR HIGHLIGHT: NANCY GSKO



A born and bred Californian, Nancy grew up in Los Angeles with her parents and three brothers. She attended UC Santa Cruz, where she designed an independent major, Movement Therapy. After college, she moved to San Francisco to pursue her MBA, and worked in banking as a Human Resource professional. While in SF, she met and married her husband, Max, an artist and guitar maker.

While raising their three daughters, in the Bay Area, they visited the Tahoe area often, and treasured

their annual ski vacations and long-lasting memories. Once their children graduated from high school, Nancy and Max moved to Northstar permanently, and never looked back. Nancy says that she wakes up every morning and pinches herself to see if all of this is just a dream or if she is lucky enough to live in this magical place.

Nancy is passionate about education, women's rights, and health. This led her to the areas she serves and gives in our community. When she moved here, Queen of Hearts Women's Fund was in its first year, and actively seeking members. Fast forward to today, she has served on the leadership team of the Women's Fund for four years. Nancy reflects that the most rewarding aspect of her volunteerism is the engagement and connectedness of the membership. She is proud of the programs that have launched under her leadership, including Aim High, which attracted over 70 contributors, and Girls Giving Back, which currently has 20 middle and high school girls becoming involved in our community.

Nancy is also active with Excellence in Education, where she is immediate past president. She also balances her time traveling, being outdoors, and making the most amazing chocolate confections for her closest community of friends and colleagues.

ELEVATE TAHOE



In spring 2014, three collaborators (TTCF, Moonshine Ink, and SBS Media House) produced a 7-minute short film for the Queen of Hearts Annual Dinner about Food Innovations at 6,000 feet. The now 20 minute film has been featured in community clubs, venues, and even the Nevada City Wild and Scenic Film Festival, winning attention and kudos both locally and nationally.



In this film, we explore the challenges of growing and accessing quality fresh food here in the high alpine climate. We explore Sunmie Won, who grows food for her family all year round, and Alicia Funk, who forages and documents the native edible plant species. We also highlight the Tahoe Food Hub, a local nonprofit that is sourcing farm fresh food within 100 miles for commercial businesses and our schools; Harvest of the Month, a volunteer educational program that exposes our students to a variety of local, seasonal foods; and finally, Sierra Valley Farms, a commercial farm that is successfully growing here in the mountains.



TTCF's catalytic role in this initiative represents one of many endeavors we are undertaking to identify the challenges and solutions of our community through powerfully crafted storytelling. We plan to continue exploring new topics through a variety of platforms to shine a light on North Tahoe.



SCHOLARSHIP FUNDS

TTCF believes that supporting the education and dreams of our youth yields the highest return on investment. Honoring the legacy and generosity of similar-minded donors, TTCF, and our volunteer scholarship committee manages several needs-based and honorary scholarships to help students pay for college. In total, TTCF awarded \$67,800, in 2014, through 9 scholarships.

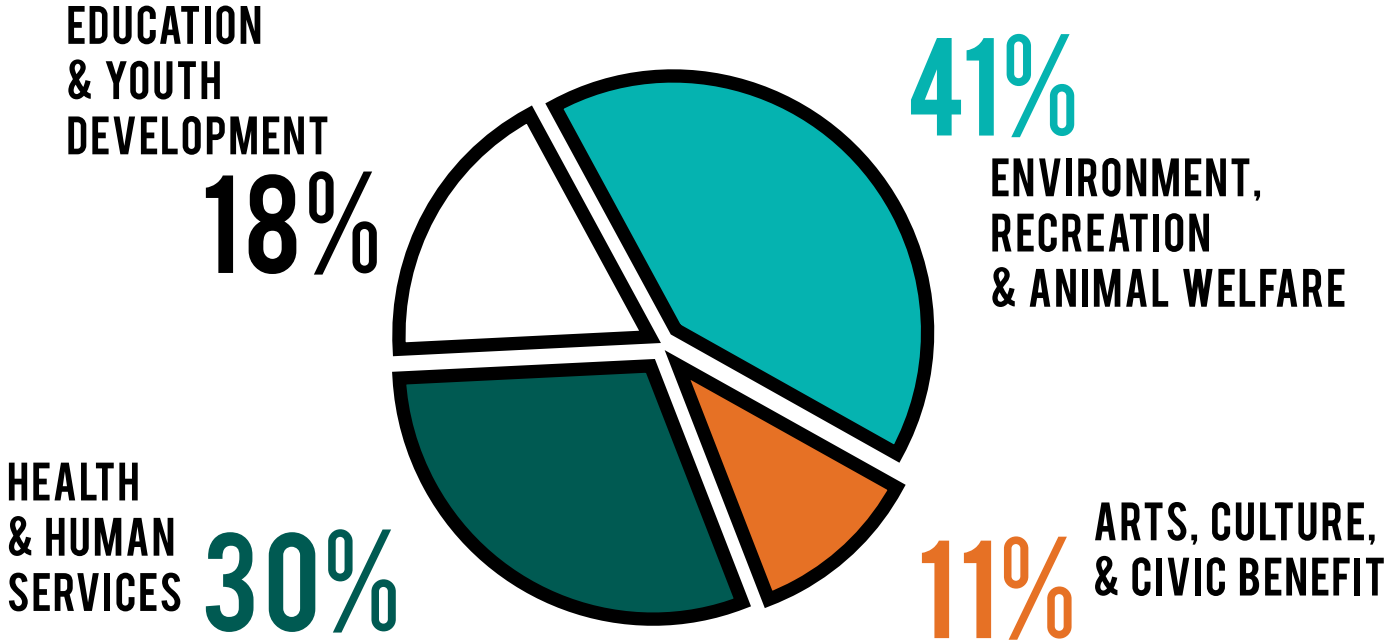

DONOR HIGHLIGHT: RICHARD ANDERSON



Richard Anderson first fell in love with the Sierra when visiting a family cabin as a teenager. He began fishing when he was in third grade in Strawberry Creek, a tiny stream much like Trout Creek here in Truckee. Richard became entranced with its small rainbow and brook trout, and with the challenge of hooking these fish. And really, he became entranced with the woods surrounding him, which invited exploration and play—idyllic terrain for childhood.

Those years were formative amid the trees and beside the water. They led Richard first into city planning, then into publishing, where he launched California Fly Fisher magazine. Eventually this led him back to Truckee, and he returned as a full-time resident to the mountains he loves.

Having lived in very small towns and very big cities, he appreciates the value of community and the need to give back to it. Having served (and still serving) as an elected official, Richard says he is familiar with the limits of government. He supports a range of nonprofits that assist the disadvantaged or protect our environs, which led him to create the Truckee Tahoe Trout Fund, a donor-advised fund within the Tahoe Truckee Community Foundation, that provides grants specifically for improving our local fisheries.

Philanthropy, for Richard, is a form of home maintenance, except home extends beyond the walls of his house, to include the broader place we inhabit daily and the people and creatures that are living here. Richard muses, “How lucky, how extraordinary, that many in Truckee and North Tahoe share a similar desire to invest in us.”

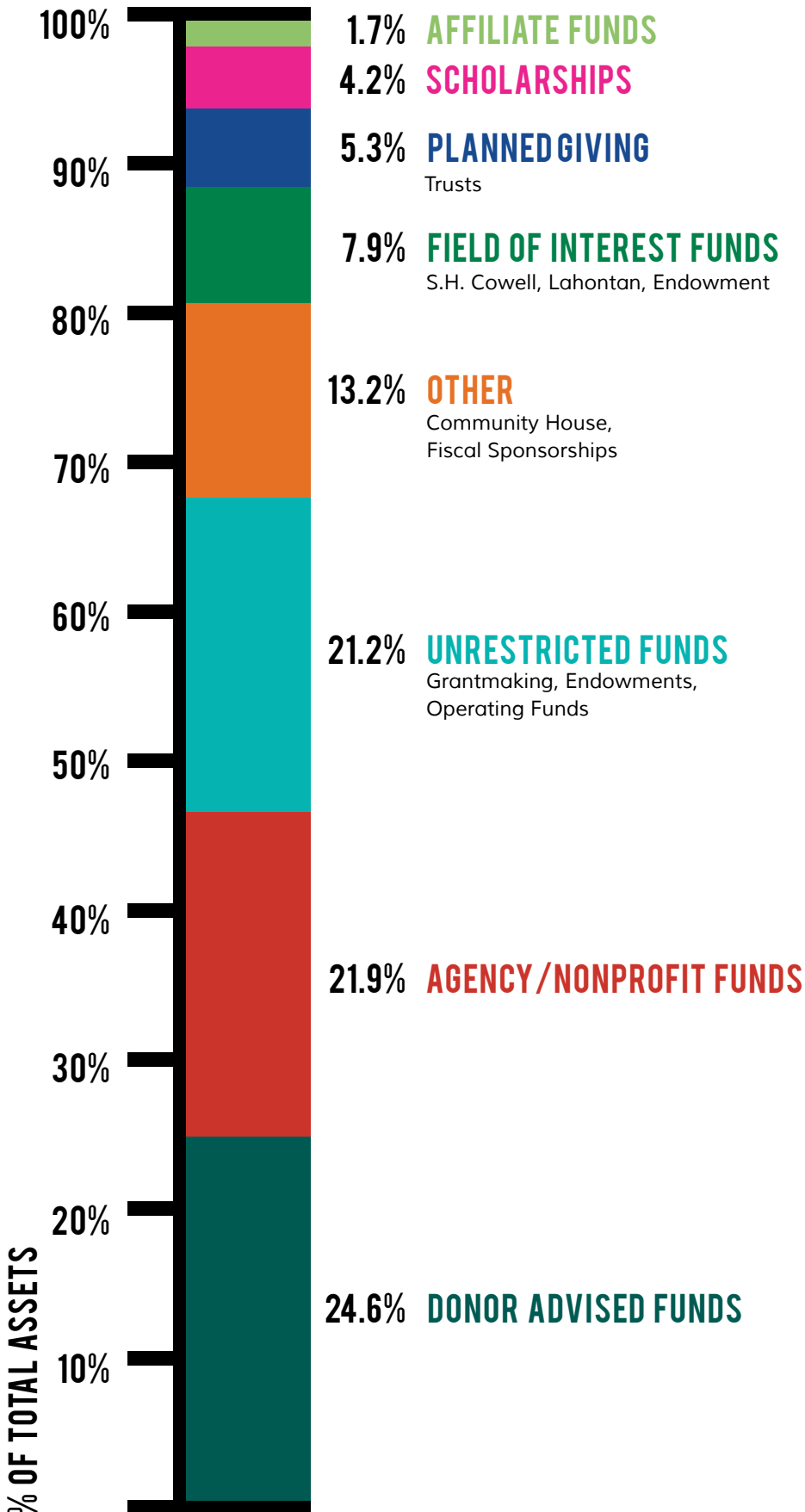
